Re: Capacity Building of Farmers and Networking of Farmers' Organisations and Upscaling the Idea of L3F in the Academic Institutions

The Commonwealth of Learning (COL) seeks to confirm through this Contribution Agreement ('the agreement') the support to be provided to Arul Anandar College (AAC) to replicate the L3F model in other academic institutions in India.

# 1.0 Statement of Activities for AAC

- 1.1. AAC in accordance with the Results Based Management Framework (Annex 1) shall undertake the following activities:
  - 1.1.1. strengthening the ongoing mobile based continuous learning of farmers in Madurai district with a target of reaching 2000 farmers;
  - 1.1.2. training and capacity building of 30 farmers of Coconut Farmers Producer Organization (FPO) on producing and marketing of coir pith as a soil conditioner and networking with other three FPOs in Madurai district to form a L3F consortium;
  - 1.1.3. conducting Career Oriented Course (COC) on Multimedia for Lifelong Learning and ODL targeting 160 students (30% women students), and making efforts to replicate the course in other academic and training institutions;
  - 1.1.4. support to conduct MobiMOOC for 1500 farmers to address the learning need of the local farmers;
  - 1.1.5. content creation such as voice mails to promote mobile learning, multimedia content and you tube to upload in L3Fpedia.com as OER to promote farmers learning;
  - 1.1.6. organising a workshop for up scaling of Multimedia for Lifelong Learning (L3F) Open and Distance Learning (ODL) course in other colleges and Universities for 20 academic and training institutions:
  - 1.1.7. acknowledge COL's contribution by seeking approval from COL on how its name will be displayed;
  - 1.1.8. provide periodic updates to COL on a regular basis over the term of the agreement on the status of activities undertaken; and
  - 1.1.9. prepare a final report and submit it to COL.



## 2.0 COL Responsibilities and COL Contact

- 2.1. COL shall contribute resources up to a maximum of CAD 16,500 (equivalent to INR 907,500) towards the statement of activities.
- 2.2. The COL staff member with whom AAC should liaise on all matters related to this agreement shall be Dr Moses Tenywa, Education Specialist: Agriculture & Livelihoods at mtenywa@col.org

## 3.0 Deliverables and Timeframe

- 3.1. The above agreement shall commence when both parties have signed and a copy has been returned to COL and will continue in effect until June 30, 2021 with the following deliverables and timelines:
  - 3.1.1. provide evidence of strengthening the ongoing mobile based continuous learning of for 2000 farmers in Madurai district by January 29, 2021;
  - 3.1.2. provide evidence of training 30 farmers of Coconut Farmers Producer Organization (FPO) on producing and marketing of coir pith as a soil conditioner by March 31, 2021;
  - 3.1.3. provide evidence of conducting Career Oriented Course (COC) on Multimedia for Lifelong Learning and ODL targeting 160 students (30% women students) by March 31, 2021;
  - 3.1.4. provide evidence of training 1500 farmers using mobiMOOC technology to address the learning need of the local farmers by March 31, 2021;
  - provide evidence of creating 600 new voice mail, 25 multimedia and 25 YouTube contents prepared by March 31, 2021;
  - 3.1.6. provide evidence of organizing a joint workshop with 20 academic and training institutions by June 30, 2021; and
  - 3.1.7. consolidated final report, using COL's reporting templates, covering 1.1.1 to 1.1.8 with audited financial statements by July 30, 2021.

## 4.0 Gender Equality

4.1 Gender equality is integral to all of COL's work and requires that both women's and men's views, interests and needs shape its work in learning for development. AAC agrees that gender considerations shall inform the activities to be undertaken under this agreement.

# 5.0 Contribution and Invoices

- 5.1. A maximum sum of up to CAD 16,500 (equivalent to INR 907,500) based on the attached budget at Annex 1 shall be paid as a contribution by COL in 3 instalments to AAC as outlined below:
  - 5.1.1. first instalment of CAD 8,000 shall be paid as an accountable advance following receipt of the signed agreement and invoice;



- 5.1.2. second instalment of CAD 7,000 shall be paid upon receipt and acceptance by COL of the report as outlined under 3.1.1 by March 31, 2021; and
- 5.1.3. final instalment of up to CAD 1,500 shall be paid upon receipt and acceptance by COL of the deliverables as outlined under 1.1.1 to 1.1.9 by June 30, 2021 as well as receipt of the statement of accounts, substantiated by an audited report by an accredited institution or auditor. The statement of accounts will reconcile expenditure with the budget at Annexure I and clear any accountable advances. Any amounts not spent in accordance with this agreement will be refundable to COL upon request.
- 5.2. COL's terms of payment for each instalment shall be within thirty days of receipt and acceptance of:
  - 5.2.1. the deliverables as outlined in the timeframe specified, and
  - 5.2.2. an invoice.
- 5.3. The invoice(s) shall contain the agreement number, the name and address of the payee, and the amount of instalment due under the agreement. To facilitate the direct wire transfer of funds, the bank name, address, identity number and swift code, account number and name of account shall be required. Within Canada, COL shall normally make payment by cheque.
- 5.4. If AAC fails to deliver any or all goods, services or materials as specified in the Statement of Activities within the time period (s) specified in the agreement, COL reserves the right to amend the contribution due under this agreement.
- 6.0 Copyright and Intellectual Property
- 6.1. AAC shall assign to COL any copyright arising from the works produced in relation to the activities provided while executing this agreement.
- 6.2. COL as copyright holder shall hold the unrestricted rights to republish the work in any format at any time including editing the work and associating the work with other work.
- 7.0 Liability and Insurance
- 7.1. COL shall not assume any liability for any injuries or damage to AAC, its staff and associates incurred during the course of this agreement.
- 7.2. AAC shall undertake full responsibility for the purchase of any health and medical, accident or other insurance which may be necessary in respect of any loss, injury damage or illness occurring during the execution of this agreement.
- 8.0 Termination
- 8.1. This agreement may be terminated by either party before the expiry date of the agreement by giving written notice to the other party. The period of notice shall be five days in the case of agreements for a total period of less than two months and ten days in the case of agreements for a longer period.



- 8.2. As a result of termination, AAC shall have no claim against COL other than payment on a prorata basis for no more than the actual amount of work performed to the satisfaction of COL. Amounts received in advance but not spent in accordance with the agreement will be refundable to COL.
- 9.0 Confidentiality
- 9.1. Any information of a character confidential to the affairs of COL, to which AAC becomes privy as a result of the work performed during this project, shall be treated as confidential, unless disclosure of such information is required by law.
- 10.0 Assignment
- 10.1 This agreement may not be assigned to another party without the prior written consent of COL.
- 11.0 Amendments
- This agreement may be amended by a letter of amendment specifying all modifications with 11.1. the written consent of both parties.

Section 5: Outputs and Outcomes

Please describe how the activities will lead to the outcomes (Theory of Change):

AAC is located in the backward region of the state and working for poor and marginal farmers, rural women, rural girls and students from marginalized communities. Farmers in this region get poor income, lack resources and multiple livelihood opportunities.

AAC- ACPR intends to create more livelihood opportunities for farmers and farm laborers and to increase their family income. It tries to achieve this goal by training them on capacity building, skill development, continuous learning, creating farmer collectives through social mobilization, developing entrepreneurial skills and promoting sustainable agricultural practices.

Coconut FPO leaders will be trained on production and marketing strategies in coir pith business. A consortium of FPOs will be created. Consortium will give collective strength it will help to facilitate mutual support for better management of FPOs, sharing of their managerial, technical knowledge, increase the opportunities and achieve scale in business. ACPR will conduct need assessment and create new contents for farmers learning. Continuous learning of farmers through mobile learning methods and gaining new knowledge will help them to perform sustainable agricultural practices and convertible farming as profit making enterprise. Rural students and girls will develop the employability skills through the COC on multimedia for lifelong Learning and ODL. It will help them in getting employment. Through sustained efforts AAC will help other institutions to replicate L3F course and increase the number of students trained on L3F concept and method.
